



CITY RECEIVES \$1M IN USDA FUNDING

The City of Humble was recently awarded \$1 million in federal funding from the United States Department of Agriculture to be used for public safety initiatives. The funds will be used for the purchase of mobile radios for both Humble Police and Fire, a new firearm casing processing system, advanced DNA collection system, mobile heart monitors and defibrillators, new fire station alerting systems, and fire-ground rehabilitation systems. The funding was made possible through a Congressional allocation that was spearheaded by the late U.S. Representative Sheila Jackson Lee, who worked with City staff on initiating the funding request several years ago.

KEEP YARD WASTE OUT OF THE STREETS



Blowing grass clippings, leaves and/or improperly placing other yard waste in the street is illegal by ordinance. Grass, leaves and other debris are to be properly placed in bags for disposal. Not only does yard waste interfere with the storm water drainage system but also clogs up our street sweeper. Our street sweepers have been instructed to drive around such debris and you will likely receive a visit from Code Enforcement – recurring violations may result in a citation and fine.

CITY STRENGTHENS TREE PRESERVATION

The City Council recently amended the Tree Preservation Ordinance. Commercial development, which often times clear cuts tracts of land, will now be required to re-plant a minimum of one 100-gallon tree for every 40 feet of street frontage and provide for landscaping shrubbery if the previously required buffer area of existing trees cannot be saved. Additionally the city has identified certain species of trees and shrubs that are to be used for replanting purposes in an effort to further protect established forested areas and enhance future development's appeal.

NORTHSHIRE ROAD REPAIRS ON THE WAY
